


Fabaceae - Pea Family


- Zygomorphic flowers
- Five petals comprising
 one upper lip (standard),
 two free laterals (wings)
 and two fused lower lips
 (keel)
- Five sepals fused into calyx tube
- Leaves often compound
- Stipules present. Usually leafy
- Leaves alternate
- Ten stamens
- Ovary superior
- One carpel
- One style
- Fruit a pod




Example species

Lotus corniculatus – Bird's Foot Trefoil

- Yellow flowers often tinged red
- 2-8 flowers per head
- Procumbent habit
- Stem solid
- Calyx teeth erect in bud
- Trifoliolate leaflets with leafy stipules at the base of the leaf stalk





Fruit Character

The fruit of members of the Fabaceae family are generally legumes. On maturity these pods open into two valves to eject the seeds within.
